


















AMEN: Describe your music in your own words.

MATT: It's basically reggae, funk, ska, soul. Most of the time we play with an aggressive edge, that's where the hardcore influence shows.

GREG: We are all interested in a lot of different types of music and that manifests itself in the music we play. Reggae, for example, has nothing to do with the culture in which we were brought up but we took that culture and interpreted it our own way.

MATT: I hate people just calling us a reggae band because there is a lot more than that going on. Our new songs are mostly funk and soul.

AMEN: Why do you play at punk/hardcore clubs?

GREG: That's our roots. We identify with that now just as much as we did then, the atmosphere and the fact that people are there for music's sake.

MATT: I went to shows before we even had the band so a lot of what we listened to was hardcore. I remember always getting bored at shows. I would have liked to see a band like us because it would have been refreshing. The shows got really stale.

AMEN: What are the pros and cons of being brothers in a band together?

MATT: We know eachother really well, that's a pro and a con.

GREG: We know our strengths and weaknesses even more than our close friends just by virtue of the fact that we grew up in the same house. We know a lot of the deep dark secrets.

AMEN: How did Cheshire end up playing with you?

GREG: I worked with a friend of hers and I met her through him. I knew that Dr. Tree was looking for a drummer and I found out that she played drums and I hooked them up. Since then there has been a comeradery between the bands.

MATT: We wanted a percussionist but she's not the only person who's done it, Chuck Tree has too. We want to have a permanent percussionist but we don't now.

AMEN: Tell us about the tour.

GREG: It's starting on September 22 in Annarbour and Carol Shutzbank has put it all together. BYO is booking California for us and hopefully we'll play Vegas. It's going to last close to two months and we'll be living out of our van. I'm looking foward to it, intense and new situiations. The majority of the people are not going to have heard of us. We are going to have to go out there with the attitude that the music we play means something to us and regardless of how we're accepted we are going to continue to play it.

MATT: People will pick that up. If we are confident of what we are doing, people will appreciate it.

MATT: That revival show was ideal, people came to see us. We still feel that we have to win over crowds, that when people see us it's a new crowd unless we play an all ages show in Philly.

AMEN: Do you still work at the Taco House?

MATT: I've been working there since September but not anymore. I'll probably be going back after the tour, they said that it would be hard to replace me.

AMEN: What is the history of Scram?

GREG: Matt started playing guitar when he was thirteen.

MATT: I wanted to have a band real bad.

GREG: Craig learned drums they got together with different people.

MATT: Greg thought it would be fun and he wanted to Join the band.

GREG: The fact that they were having fun...if these guys weren't having fun I wouldn't have done it. In rythm there was fun.

MATT: We listened to the same bands and we thought a lot alike that's why it was ideal. Even though it was fun playing with those other people there wasn't a unified feeling in the band. When Greg joined the band it was more than just music to me.

GREG: It was early eighty four, so it's been a while.



AMEN: How old are you?

MATT: Greg is twenty five, I'm twenty and Craig is twenty two.

AMEN: What are some of your favorite local and

faraway bands?

MATT: Pagan Babies! ELM, Dr. Tree, Trained Attack Dogs, The Redskins, Billy Bragg, The Jam, Style Council, LKJ.

GREG: The same bands as Matt... James Brown, all kinds of Reggae, old soul, old funk.

AMEN: What was your favorite show you ever played?

MATT: Tha all ages show at revival.

GREG: That was one of mine too, the crowd was great, the response was great.

MATT: In the middle of "Stand Up" when I asked the people, "If you believe that you're the future scream it out and say OH YEAH." and the "oh yeah" was so loud. From that point on I was going nuts.

GREG: I can't wait untill we get some records out and concievably most shows could be like that.

AMEN: It is rumored that you are a political band, is this true?

MATT: I thought it was obvious.

GREG: We want to convey that attitude, that we are a band that is concerened with society and we want to provide communication that will create a bridge between us and the audience. There will be a dialouge that will ensue and that will bring about change. We talk about the fact that things, the way they are now, where profit takes presidence over people, brings on a lot of racism and sexism and destruction of the environment. Hopefully people will hear what we say and it's up to the to absorb it and hopefully change will come

MATT: Yes, we are a political band. People should be politically aware and active because politics affect their lives. Something that frustrates me with hardcore is that even bands who have good things to say aren't really political because they don't take a stand...like Seven Seconds they don't have and political statement.

GREG: Matt and I are constantly questioning our own values and what the band means.

MATT: The only way change will come is if people organize and do things. What we are doing isn't going to do shit because we're just talking. It might inspire people to act. I hate to label myself, but we're all socialists. The economic system should be based on cooperation not competition, that's the problem with this country. People should work together.

AMEN: What material do you have out?

GREG: The Stand Up LP, Plus Records Comp "That Was Then, This Is Now," even though none of us skate we're on Skate Rock vol. #4...

AMEN: How has your sound changed?

MATT: We used to play some thrash songs, straight ahead punk. I remember I found our first set list and it was a mixture of thrash, oi and reggae.

GREG: Now we are delving more into funk.

AMEN: Who did the cover of your new album?

MATT: Robert Boyes, he's a graduate of PCA and the lead singer and bass player of Dr. Tree.

AMEN: How did you join up with BYO?

MATT: We played a show with Youth Brigade, when they were Youth Brigade, and they liked us. Two of my favorite bands were Youth Brigade and Seven Seconds so I was into that, we thought that they stood for something.

GREG: It seemed that all the bands that were on the label questioned the status quo. But the problem with those bands is that they say it with cliches, but it's good to be a part of something like that. I basically like those bands because theres not many bands that are even trying to do anything.

AMEN: How do crowds react when you play out of state?

MATT: The farthest away we have played is New Brunswick, we played four CYSPUS benifits, now we have a bit of a following. The first out of town show we played was in Allentown with the Freeze. People didn't know what to do, they were just looking at us, they didn't know how to dance. By the end of the set they were going nuts. I like it when people stage dive when they are having fun.

GREG: We played down in DC at an anti contra aid rally. It was a lot of fun. That type of show, where there wasn't an amazing response but people were listening and paying attention, I'm hoping that will be the kind of response we will get on the tour.

AMEN: Do you have any final comments?

GREG: Our music has changed into something more acessable and diverse. One of our goals was to play a lot of types of music is because we want to, and to reach more people.

MATT: The last time we played New Brunswick they put us on a bill with a reggae band with a steel drum. It looked like it was going to be hell, it was like eighty five percent black people and west indians...but they were really into it, espesially the guys in the other band. When we played DC, the people who bought our records were not the regular people who come to our shows, a rastafarian and old hippyish types. That's what we want to do, we have nothing against being popular, we want to reach more people.

GREG: Without sacrificing any of our ideals. We only play the music that we thouroughly enjoy... that's first and foremost.

### Toll-Free Woes

Clogging Jerry's phones

Al hile Oral Roberts struggles with budgets. Fundamentalist Preacher Jerry Falwell faces a different kind of money pinch. The Lynchburg, Va., televangelist has long used toll-free phone numbers to assist viewers seeking spiritual help. The code-800 exchange has also worked well for fund raising, since those who phone in free are more likely to make pledges.

For many months Falwell foes, aware that each phone-in costs \$1, have purposely clogged his lines. First an Atlantan who objects to TV ministers programmed his computer to dial Falwell every 30 seconds. Before Southern Bell stepped in, the stunt cost Falwell \$750,000. Then it was homosexual periodicals egging on readers to act against Falwell, an enemy of gay liberation. Late last year the Daily Cardinal student newspaper at the University of Wisconsin. Madison, ran a column advocating "telephone terrorism" and listed the 800 numbers of several targets. including Falwell.

The TV preacher estimates that annoyance calls cost him more than \$1 million last year, not counting lost donations. Falwell, who is considering legal action, regards the calls as "unlawful activities" that do "injury to the cause of Christ."

Mike let out a blood curdling yell and Bruce did a slapstick jump, screamed, "He's gonna kill me!" and started to run down the street.


Everyone got out of the way and there was an immediate hubbub, "Did you see that, he just freaked out!"



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
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
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
